As the new President, Paul says that he does not intend trying to fill Peter's shoes but he is always open to speak with and listen to anyone at just about any time.




#### <u>Tribute to valued Pyrmont Cares Team members who have passed away</u>

#### **VALE BILL BURTON**

Glasgow-born Bill Burton came to Australia at 12 years old. Before long he ran away to The Kimberleys to work as an underage jackaroo, joining up with the aborigines to learn how to live on country. He then worked on a prawn fishing boat, bought a motorbike & rode (still underage) around Australia to Sydney where he joined the cast of "Hair". He gravitated to the squatter community in Pyrmont at the age of 20, undertaking an informal political education through group discussions and cultivating his musical talents in bands such as Beer+Vomit+Regurgitation, Chainsaw Rock and Froghorn Leghorn. He then undertook a 17-year career as a roadie with rock bands.




Returning to Pyrmont in 1992 he became a community activist.

As a sole parent, he was asked by his 4-year old son to read him a story, to which Bill had to admit to being illiterate. He decided to rectify this, enrolled in TAFE, became highly literate and even worked in The State Library (blending his acquired literary and musical skills to organise the first band performance on the Mitchell Library roof). He became a parent again in 2002, but Angelique required full-time parenting and tragically died at age 13.

He was always an optimist, helping community groups. He helped young (and not-so-young) musicians in the Christmas In Pyrmont festival, and was a stalwart volunteer with Pyrmont Cares. Accompanying Bill on the truck would involve entertaining stories about roadies & rock bands, including which particular open space we were now passing in which he had shared recreational substances with musical icons, referring to (insert name of famous Aussie rock star here) being a "dopehead", etc.

Bill was a colourful local character and will be missed.

### VALE BRIAN DELANEY (14 APRIL 1937 - 13 FEBRUARY 2024)



Brian and his wife Carole Twist, have lived in Pyrmont for many years. They were both involved in many charitable works throughout inner Sydney and Pyrmont/Ultimo.

It was Carole that suggested to some of her Jacksons Landing neighbours

that they should start collecting items sent to their rubbish rooms in their high rise buildings. Her idea was that these items could be distributed to those in need.

This challenge was taken up by Peter Devoy, John Hoff and John Marsden. Jon Simpson from the Heritage Fleet was also involved at this time lending out the ute from the Heritage Fleet! Carole and Brian's idea eventually evolved into the hugely successful Pyrmont Cares.

Brian was well known for helping other people! His ute was used by many people in Pyrmont to move their belongings around at some stage.

Brian worked on the Pyrmont Cares truck for many years, only retiring when he became ill. Pyrmont Cares volunteers will remember him because of his distinctive Bib and Brace overalls when on duty driving the truck. He was always helpful, willing and a hard worker and always with a smile on his face.

The Lord Mayor made a <u>speech</u> to Council on Monday 8th April in which Brian's life and contribution to society was recognised. A minute's silence was observed in his honour.

#### **VALE WADE HUDSON**

One of our valued volunteers, Wade Hudson, died on 25th January 2024. He

died alone, in a park, from undiagnosed meningitis. His passing and the tragic circumstances have been a huge shock, causing much heartache to many.

Wade was the rarest of volunteers, he actually started as a client. What a wonderful thing! He visited our depot in late 2021 to collect a microwave his caseworker from The Bobby Goldsmith Foundation had organised, and I remember clearly his friendly enthusiasm right from that first visit. He asked all about our service and said he'd like to be involved.



Wade had more challenges in his life than most of us can even imagine, and yet he wanted to help and give back to the community. Wade started helping us in early 2022, he did some pickups, some deliveries but mostly he helped us in the depot. So much younger than most of us and so fit and strong! Tuesdays at Pyrmont Cares are much heavier and more difficult without Wade there with us. Wade also helped us appreciate the aesthetics of certain furniture choices for our clients!

Wade would shock the operations team in sharing some of his life experiences, yet somehow he remained a positive and compassionate person who was genuinely interested in others.

To quote Wendy, "Many the time he would check in with me, to see how I was, and I am proud to count him as a friend of mine, and a friend of Pyrmont Cares".

He made us laugh, he made us cry.



I'm looking forward to no longer playing fridge Tetris, but instead being able to prepare meals for me and my son, freeze teething rings and clocks, and having space for a 2L milk and a 2L juice.

Thank you especially for the toy shelves. It seems like it might have been a bit of an afterthought but it made my son so happy.

His hands are a blur because he's in the middle of enthusiastically banging on it. It is the perfect size for him, and will, I'm sure, be the site of a lot of imaginative play."

From Kim in Darlinghurst to her case worker -

"I want to thank you for organising the 'fridge with Pyrmont Cares.

The new one is better even than I dared to hope for. It fills the space in the cabinetry perfectly... Its a really good stainless steel one, its very quiet and much more up to date than the other one and much more energy efficient and more effective with the chilling.

I'm already saving money on food as its much more effective. I had to defrost every 3 days with a hair dryer with the previous one!

The whole thing was a happy story from the start. Wendy is so engaging and efficient and she followed through on everything making the delivery stressless and including the mixer and the slow cooker along with the 'fridge. All three items are really good quality, clean and look new. Wow... I can't believe it! its making a difference to me right away.... increasing the variety of the things I can prepare, store and cook. Toby is impressed as well, I can tell! His dining experience has gone up a few notches too.

I feel I should mention that the delivery was excellent in every way. The team were respectful and organised and had it out of the truck and up the lift in no time. Bruce and Kim ( my namesake) and a 3rd bloke who's name I didn't get, were so professional and thoughtful. They called me twice to appraise me of the timing etc. All this is appreciated....so nice especially given my challenges and difficulties."
